Farmers – animal owners	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Prevention, control and treatment of diseases • Management support / peace of mind • Prevention zoonoses
Food chain operators	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Prevention zoonoses • Predictable sourcing and quality
Consumers	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Variety of healthy, affordable, quality food • Prevention zoonoses
FOR THE PLANET	
Efficient use of resources	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 20% animal production lost to animal diseases (OIE) • Official inspection discards products diseased animals
Protection ecosystem	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Extensive grazing (BTV-8 and Schmallenberg) • Tourism / leisure / sports • Aquaculture versus wild catch
Environment	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Less use of resources and lower output of carbon, methane, nitrogen, phosphorus, etc
FOR THE ECONOMY	
Efficient use of resources	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Healthy animals are efficient producers of a predictable variety of quality food at affordable prices • More output with less input

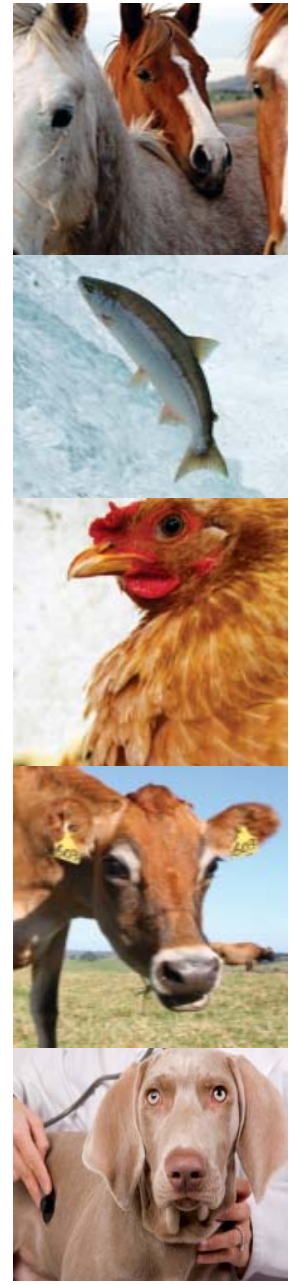
