





The OIE standard setting process is:

- Consensus based
 - Science based
 - Transparent





- OIE standards are adopted by the World Assembly of Delegates
- · But there are a lot of 'actors' prior to adoption

The main actors include ...



- OIE Specialist Commissions
- OIE experts: OIE *Ad hoc* Groups, Working Group (wildlife), Reference Centre experts;
- OIE Delegates (and their National Focal Points)
- Regional and international organisations

- 3 year term (current term 2015-2018, elections in May)






Importation or transit of aquatic animals and aquatic animal products for any purpose regardless of the infection with SVCV spring viraemia of carp status of the exporting country, zone or compartment


- Competent Authorities should not require any conditions related to SVCY, regardless of the infection with SVCV status of the exporting country, zone or compartment, when authorising the importation or transit of the following aquatic animal products derived from the a species referred to in Article 10.9.2. that which are intended for any purpose and which-comply with Article 5.4.1.:
 - a) heat sterilised hermetically sealed fish products (i.e. a heat treatment at 121°C for at least 3.6 minutes or equivalent that has been demonstrated to inactivate SVCV);
 - pasteurised fish products that have been subjected to heat treatment at 90°C for at least ten minutes (or any time/temperature equivalent which that has been demonstrated to inactivate SVCV);
 - mechanically dried eviscerated fish (i.e. a heat treatment at 100°C for at least 30 minutes or any time/temperature equivalent which that has been demonstrated to inactivate SVCV);
 - d) fish oil:
 - e) fish meal
- 2) When authorising the importation or transit of aquatic animals and aquatic animal products of a species referred to in Article 10.9.2., other than those referred to in point 1 of Article 10.9.3., Competent Authorities should require the conditions prescribed in Articles 10.9.7, to 10.9.124, relevant to the infection with SVCV
- When considering the importation or transit of aquatic animals and aquatic animal products of a species not when considering the importation or transit or expense arithment arythment arithment and appeared in Article 10.9.2, but which could reasonably be expected to pose a risk of transmiss on spread of SVCV, the Competent Authority should conduct a risk analysis in accordance with the recommendations in Chapter 2.1. The Competent Authority of the exporting country should be informed of



Code Commission reports are circulated to Delegates, Focal Points and Organisations with cooperative agreement for their comments (each February and September)




Also increasingly transparency on the OIE website (portals of the four Specialised Commissions)



Code Commission reviews comments, revises text and recirculates for further comment or proposes for adoption.

'Normally' two cycles to adoption is (2-4 years) Fast track can be 1 year





- Adoption during the World Assembly in May:
 - By consensus; in most cases
 - By vote (2/3 majority, quorum needed)
- via Resolutions of the World Assembly of Delegates


Role of OIE Delegate




- 1. Submit comments on proposed amendments to existing text /new text;
