






Importance of pigs in Africa



- Livelihoods, income generation
 - Short cycle species with modest requirement for land
 - Can thrive in low input production systems
 - Act as a mobile bank
- Food security and improved nutrition
 - Precocious and prolific produce large amounts of affordable protein
- Ceremonies weddings, funerals, bride price
- Other functions
 - Source of soap, lard, manure, bristles
 - Societal support gifts to bereaved community members, rehabilitation after trauma and loss

Africa's pork production/value chains



Large scale commercial

- Compartmentalised farms
- South Africa: 65% of sector, free of ASF, CSF, FMD; includes some breeders/suppliers of genetic material
- Export of pork through designated abattoirs 99% is exported to SADC region
- Zimbabwe compartmentalisation has been implemented but we need more information
- Commercial farms with a high level of biosecurity
- Varying number in most countries in the region
- Value chains
- Slaughter at registered larger abattoirs; with documentation
- Pork destined for retail outlets and export (compartments)

Other

- Small scale, backyard, traditional, communal
- Pigs often bought and sold at live markets/auction yards
- May be sold through agents (middle men) who go from farm to farm
- May be slaughtered through large, medium or small abattoirs, local butchers or slaughter slabs; pork destination depends on abattoir
- May be slaughtered at home and meat sold locally
- Control of movement is difficult in this sector.
- Cross-border value chains for pigs and pork exist; may operate continuously or in response to price differentials
- Movements linked to ceremonies and gifts occur
- Most ASF outbreaks occur in this sector due to lack of biosecurity

A wide spectrum, from free-ranging & scavenging to rustic & modern housing & compartments































Africa's pig and pork value chains: transport is variable










Africa's pig/pork value chains: live markets to formal sale & delivery
