Riparian communities especially of Lake Malombe fisheries sector threatened by overfishing & CC


Build resilience is the main objective

## **Epizootic Ulcerative Syndrome (EUS)**

Ist outbreak in Malawi July 2020

Enhancing capacity to respond & manage the risk of EUS in Malawi (TCP/MLW/3804)

\$300,000 - FAO TCP

Feb 2021 - Dec 2023

Outbreak control & enhance surveillance capacity & control by improving biosecurity governance



## **EUS - Focus area/expected results**

- I. Strategy on aquatic animal health & biosecurity developed (LoA with DoF)
- 2. EUS status is determined through active surveillance (LUANAR + DoF)
- 3. Strengthen biosecurity governance (LUANAR + DAHLD)



Mar 2020 - Feb 2025

Coverage = 10 countries in ACP (TZ & ZW from SFS)

**Donor = EU & Germany** 

**Budget = 47.8 Million USD** 



## 2.4 Tanzania & Zimbabwe


ACP countries account for only 10% of global fish traded

Value of traded fish decreased from 4.6% (2003) to 3.5% (2016)

Urgent need to enhance fish value chains productivity & competitiveness

And long-term sustainability & social inclusiveness.

## 2.4 Tanzania



The Lake Tanganyika sprat, sardine & perch VC is one of the 12 VC selected over 70 proposals

#### Focus area/results

- I. Value chain analysis & upgrading strategy
- 2. Improving processing & cold chain techniques
- 3. Improving business models to supply high-value markets
- 4. Increasing female participation
- 5. Increasing compliance with fisheries legislation



## 2.4 Zimbabwe

### FISH4ACP aims to enhance tilapia aquaculture industry

#### Focus areas/results

- Improve tilapia aquaculture VC
- Expanding production & opening it up to new markets.
- Unlocking potential of smallholder fish farmers
- Increase production of high-quality fish for local consumption & export.

## 5. Sub-regional initiatives


#### Focus area

Joint fish stock assessments & fisheries frame surveys (riparian systems) conducted

- I. Consult fisheries institutions around Lake Tanganyika & Malawi
- 2. Training on assessment of fish stocks & fisheries
- 3. Collate information on available fisheries in riparian water basins
- 4. Joint planning of the fisheries frame surveys & fish stock assessments
- 5. Execute the frame surveys & stock assessments
- 6. Technical advice, coordination & management of the project
