

Key actors of the process, roles and responsibilities







WOAH Specialist Commissions

- Four Specialist Commissions;
- Each Commission comprises six members;
- Each Commission meets twice a year to progress items on their respective work programmes (February and September).

Elected by the World Assembly of Delegates

Experts Selection process

- Open call launched July-Sept. before election year
- Experts worldwide can apply
- Endorsement sought from WOAH Delegate
- Candidates reviewed by a Selection Committee and the WOAH Council
- Council endorsed list shared with Delegates before the election

Specialist Commissions

Terrestrial Animal Health Standards Commission

Code Commission

- Oversees amendments to the Terrestrial Code
- Oversees the work of relevant ad hoc Groups and Working Groups
- Advises the Director General on issues relevant to its work

Scientific Commission for Animal Diseases

Scientific Commission

- Assesses Member dossiers for the recognition of official animal health status and endorsement of official control programmes
- Supports disease-specific strategies for disease surveillance, prevention and control
- Oversees the work of relevant ad hoc Groups and Working Groups
- Provides technical advice to the Code Commission, where relevant

Aquatic Animal Health Standards Commission

Aquatic Animal Commission

- Oversees amendments to the Aquatic Code and the Aquatic Manual
- · Oversee the work of relevant ad hoc Groups
- Proposes the designation of Reference Centres relevant to aquatic animal health and monitors their performance

Biological Standards Commission

- Oversees amendments to the Terrestrial Manual
- Proposes the designation of Reference Centres relevant to terrestrial animal health and monitors their performance
- Provides technical advice to the Code Commission, where relevant






Stepwise description of the process



Process for the elaboration of WOAH Standards





A transparent process to ensure that WOAH International Standards address Members needs and are developed based in the latest science and taking into consideration the different contexts among Members to enable implementation.



New work proposals come from:



- 1. each WOAH Specialist Commission, according to its mandate;
- 2. submitted by WOAH Members or partner International Organisations;
- 3. proposed by WOAH Working Groups;
- 4. proposed by WOAH Reference Centre experts or other WOAH experts;
- 5. from recommendations from WOAH Regional Commission Conferences or WOAH global or regional thematic conferences;
- 6. proposed as part of WOAH Strategies and coordination mechanisms with partner Organisations;
- 7. proposed by the WOAH Director General or WOAH HQ.

- AAHSC (Aquatic Code and Aquatic Manual)
- BSC (Terrestrial Manual)
- TAHSC (Terrestrial Code).



Phase 2 – Development of work










Phase 3 - Commenting and review



- .. President of the AAHSC, the BSC or the TAHSC presents the "new or revised standards" to the Assembly.
- 2. The President addresses comments from the Assembly
- 3. the Assembly considers the adoption of the "new or revised standard", with the primary aim of reaching a consensus:
 - a) If consensus is reached, the text is adopted by the Assembly;
 - b) If consensus is not reached; the President can withdraw the text, or the Assembly can decide by a formal vote (2/3 majority is required).

If a text is withdrawn from adoption or not adopted in the case of voting, the AAHSC, the BSC or the TAHSC may reconsider the work in the context of its work programmes at a following meeting.



Delegates are also invited to consult the Commission's work plan to identify potential upcoming area of work. Delegates may send the name(s) of the expert(s) via email to expert applications@woah.org 7 . However, experts must submit their relevant information by filling out this form. This information will be considered but does not guarantee that the expert will be selected. It will assist WOAH in establishing a database of internationally recognised experts.

Specialists Commissions

The relevant <u>Specialist Commission</u>, consider requests to develop new standards or review existing standards received from a range of stakeholders including from Members, partner international organisations, and its scientific network. These requests are reviewed, prioritised and included on its respective work plans. ۸۲:---








