
WOAH focuses on transparency in animal health information, building capacities in member countries, developing international standards, and fostering global initiatives to control and prevent animal diseases.

We ensure






World Assembly of Delegates

The highest authority of the Organisation

- Composed of all national Delegates
- Convenes at least once a year in May
- Adopts the standards published in the Codes and Manuals

1 Member = 1 Vote







The Delegate


National Representative to WOAH

Responsible for negotiating international standards on animal health

Convince his/her government to invest in animal disease monitoring and prevention



Appointed by the national government



The Delegate is most frequently the country's Chief **Veterinary Officer**

Is a **national** representative with international status

Notifies WOAH of the **national** animal disease situation




Represents the World Assembly of Delegates






Regional Commissions

Address specific local issues

- Can be fully considered as regional institutions
- Bureau composed of 4 Delegates elected for a 3-year term of office by the World Assembly
- Regional Commission Conferences
 - Every 2 years
 - In one of the countries of the region
- Recommendations submitted to the World Assembly for approval and implementation
- Meet annually during the World Assembly






Specialist Commissions

Elected by the World Assembly of Delegates

Functions

- Development of international standards
- Appointment of Reference Centres
- Evaluation of applications for official recognition of animal health status
- Provision of advice to the DG and the Assembly on topics pertaining to their mandate.
- Each Specialist Commission comprises six members.
- Each Commission meets twice a year to progress items on their respective work programmes.



- Provides technical advice to the Code Commission, where relevant




- Elected in May 2024 by the World Assembly of Delegates. Currently in her 1st term replacing Dr Monique Eloit who had been DG since 2015.





- Organise technical and scientific training for Members






Collaborating Centre

- Organise and host scientific meetings in collaboration with WOAH



World distribution of WOAH Collaborating Centres




