Background information

- The livestock subsector is vital for sustainable development in Sub-Saharan Africa
- Key in rural livelihoods, food security, and employment opportunities in Sub-Saharan Africa.
- Serves as economic lifelines for more than 50% of the continental population
- Contributes significantly to export earnings.
- Supports industrial development and growth.











Background information.....

Livestock Sector in Tanzania

- GDP Contribution
 - Accounts for approximately 6.7% of the National GDP (Tanzania Economic Survey, 2022)
- Employment
 - Provides direct and indirect employment to around 60% of the population, especially in rural areas

Food Security & Nutrition

• Supplies essential food products such as milk, meat, and eggs

• Export Revenue

 Contributes to foreign exchange earnings through exports of livestock products like hides and skins

Support for Rural Livelihoods

• A crucial source of income for **rural communities**














- Tanzania has a huge animal resource
- cattle which account for 1.4% and 11% of the global and African cattle population











Veterinary Services and Legislative Review in Tanzania

Resource Base

• Tanzania's livestock and fisheries sectors depend on animal health services.

Animal Health Services

- Delivered by veterinarians and veterinary paraprofessionals.
- Veterinary paraprofessionals form the frontline workforce in animal health.

Economic Context

 The shift in the 1980s toward a market-based economy highlighted the need for regulatory updates.

Legislative Review

 Initiated a review of the Veterinary Surgeon Ordinance CAP 376 of 1958 to align with modern needs.











The Veterinary Act and the Veterinary Council of Tanzania

- Legislative Update
 - Veterinary Act CAP 319 enacted in 2003, replacing the Veterinary Surgeons Ordinance CAP 376 of 1958.

Establishment of the Veterinary Council

- Veterinary Council of Tanzania established in 2004 under Section 3 of the Act.
- Replaced the Tanzania Veterinary Board.
- Role of the Veterinary Council
 - Regulates the veterinary profession, paraprofessionals, and animal health services facilities.
 - Ensures livestock farmers benefit from high-quality animal health services.













Veterinary Council of Tanzania (VCT) Registration

- Inclusion of Paraprofessionals
 - VCT registers paraprofessionals, paraprofessional assistants, and technicians.
 - These groups represent the majority and frontline workforce in animal health services in Tanzania.
- **Registration Statistics** (as of June 2024):
 - Registered Veterinarians: 1,004 registered
 - Enrolled Paraprofessionals: 2,967 enrolled
 - Enlisted Paraprofessional Assistants: 2,791 enlisted
 - Technicians: 1,130 licensed
 - Meat Inspectors: 955
 - Al Technicians: 91
 - Lab Technicians: 84











Benefits of Broad Registration of Animal Health Professionals

- Regulation and Accountability
 - Ensures that all animal health professionals are registered and regulated.

• Ethics and Standards

- Enforces compliance with professional ethics to maintain high standards in service delivery.
- Quality Assurance for Farmers
 - Guarantees that farmers receive the best possible services to support livestock health and productivity.











Challenges of Broad Registration of Animal Health Professionals

- Compliance with Continuing Professional Development (CPD)
 - Low compliance due to CPD not being compulsory for VCT registration.
 - Resistance among profession in private sector due to financial constraints.
- Legislation Enforcement Issues
 - Prosecutions for non professional criminal offenses often fail at the police or prosecuting authorities level.











WOAH-Funded Twinning Programme (2018-2020)

Partnership

- Collaboration between the Veterinary Council of Tanzania (VCT) and the South African Veterinary Council (SAVC).
- Funded by the World Organization for Animal Health (WOAH).

Programme Objective

- Enhance effectiveness in regulatory tasks performed by VCT and SAVC.
- Strengthen capacity and resources of Veterinary Service Boards (VSBs).

• Key Areas of Focus

- Improve national veterinary services.
- Ensure generation of scientific information and disease reporting.
- Promote animal and human health, as well as food security and safety.

Training Components

- Standards for veterinary training.
- Standards for veterinary practice.
- Effective functioning of Veterinary Service Boards (VSBs).











Key Developments in Veterinary Council of Tanzania (VCT)

• Day One Competencies Guidelines

 Development and adoption of guidelines to define competencies required from veterinarians from day one of practice.

• Legislation for CPD

 Formal implementation of legislation relating to Continuing Professional Development (CPD) for animal health professionals.

Registration of Veterinary Practices

- Mandatory registration of veterinary practices by registered veterinarians to ensure compliance and professionalism.
- Strategic Plan for 2020-2025
 - Drafted and adopted a strategic plan with the goal of establishing VCT as an independent Veterinary Service Board (VSB).











Key Developments in Veterinary Council of Tanzania (VCT)

- Veterinary Council of Tanzania (VCT) Self-Evaluation Report [SER]
- Development and Adoption
 - The Self-Evaluation Report (SER) was developed and adopted with positive feedback from the College of Veterinary Medicine and Biomedical Sciences (CVMBS), SUA.
- Implementation and Monitoring
 - SER in Use: Utilized in conjunction with annual visits and inspections of the Veterinary Faculty at CVMBS.
 - Curriculum Monitoring: Ensures alignment with standards for the veterinary qualification in Tanzania.
- Online Application System (2022)
 - A fully functional online system for registration of personnel and facilities.
 - System developed and overseen by the ICT unit of the Ministry to enhance efficiency in VCT operations.











The VCT contributions to the strategy development

- The Ministry of Livestock and Fisheries Developed a Multisectoral Development strategy for Animal Health workforce in 2023 in collaboration with FAO
- Aimed to ensure an adequate supply of skilled professionals capable to effectively address the diverse challenges in animal health
- The assignment was undertaken from December, 2022 to June, 2023.
- It was accomplished in phases that involved:
 - -Initial in-depth review of reports and documents on animal health workforce,
 - -Assessment of the current state of animal health workforce,
 - -Consultations with various stakeholders
 - -Validation with stakeholders
