
African Association of Veterinary Education Establishments (2A2E-V) Programs

2A2E-V President Mohammed VI Veterinary School and IAV Hassan II, Rabat, Morocco



- Of the 55 AU member states, 26 have VEEs
- North and East Africa have the most VEEs (23 each)
- West and Central Africa have the most states without a VEE (11 and 7 respectively)
- All African VEEs (recognised by country higher education authority) have a seat on the 2A2E-V General Assembly (GA) – biannually
- At the GA, 2 representatives from each of the 5 regions of AU are elected onto the Executive Committee (EC).
- EC elects a President, 2 Vice Presidents, a Secretary
 General and a Treasurer, representative of 5 regions



2A2E-V 3rd General Assembly Nairobi - November 27, 2024

- The 2A2E-V GA brought together 60 Deans of Veterinary Education Establishments (VEEs) from AU Member States or their representatives;
- Election of the Executive committee members;
- Adoption of several resolutions related to the 2A2E-V statutes.







GA resolutions

Resolution 1: It is resolved that a mandate be given to the Executive Committee with the support of the African Union Interafrican Bureau for Animal Resources (AU-IBAR) to implement Article 2 of the Statutes of the African Association of Veterinary Education Establishments, within 24 months.

Resolution 2: It is resolved that 2A2E-V will open a bank account upon registration as an association and a mandate be given to the African Union Interafrican Bureau for Animal Resources (AU-IBAR) to support and coordinate the finances of the African Association of Veterinary Education Establishments, for the next 36 months.

Resolution 3: It is resolved that, in terms of Article 7 of the Statutes, an annual membership fee of (the equivalent of) US\$250 be collected from all member institutions of the African Association of Veterinary Education Establishments, to be revised annually.

Resolution 4: It is resolved that the Statutes and the Rules and Procedures of Election of the Executive Committee of the African Association of Veterinary Education Establishments (2A2E-V), be amended.

Objective 2: Establishing African Veterinary Academic Standards for accreditation

Project 2a:

Establishment of African Veterinary Academic Standards (AVAS):

- Initial establishment of standards framework based on the Egyptian Quality Assurance Standards established in 2017
- Revision and recognition of AVAS by external referees (EAVEA of AVMA) supported by AU-IBAR
- Feedback from African VEEs about the AVAS
- Dissemination and training on the new AVAS through VEEs

Objective 2: Establishing African Veterinary Academic Standards for accreditation

Project 2b:


Establishment an AVAS self-assessment tool for VEEs in Africa recognised by AU and AUU:

- Formulation of board (EC plus continental qualified experts from regions)
- Guidelines of the application process (required documents)
- Portal for display of the AVAS (version 1)
- Establish a platform of AVAS to provide online submission of documents
- The visitation is mostly virtual with one person on site at the institution while the rest of the team are online.
- Fees should be paid by the institutions to be accredited

Objective 3: Harmonisation of the Veterinary curriculum in Africa

Project 3a:

- The Day 1 Competencies for African veterinarians were concluded by 2A2E-V in 2021. These were based on the OIE (WOAH) Day 1 Competencies.
- These form the learning outcomes of the African Veterinary curriculum
- A backward curriculum design process is promoted (Day 1 Competencies as outcome)
- Broad guidelines are given by 2A2E-V, to allow for specific differences in institutions



Objective 3: Harmonisation of the Veterinary curriculum in Africa

Project 3b: Provision of harmonised teaching materials for African VEEs:

- Day 1 Platform: an initiative by Iowa State University, funded by the Gates Foundation
- Presidents of 2A2E-V applied and received the grant (for development of bovine teaching materials) in collaboration with Ross University

Objective:

- Provide training materials on clinical cases for VEEs in Africa and the Middle East.
- Day 1 Platform will be an open educational resource (OER) for Africa

Objective 4: To enhance dissemination of innovations and good practice among African VEEs.

This year's themes are "Teaching and assessment of Clinical Skills" and "One Health Education" (coinciding with One Health Day)










VetEdAfrica 1 participants per region (total 68)

Objective 5: To build capacity among educators in the African Veterinary Education Establishments

Project 5a: Inter-African twinning programmes:

- MoUs between VEEs should be signed between all members of 2A2E-V to facilitate students and staff mobility.
- A draft MoU template should be designed by the 2A2E-V EC and shared through 2A2E-V platform.
- Funding opportunities should be recruited by 2A2E-V EC and distributed through the platform, and members should be encouraged to apply.
- AU-IBAR should assist to identify collaborators and opportunities at a higher level.
- Possible opportunities: WOAH (OIE), FAO. EU. IAEA, Intra-ACP, GIZ, JICA, USAID, SIDA, Private philanthropists e.g., Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, NGO etc

Objective 5: To build capacity among educators in the African Veterinary Education Establishments

Project 5b: Twinning programmes with international partners:

- Examples of successful twinning programmes with USA (supported by WOAH)
- New twinning project established between 2A2E-V and AAVMC (American Association of Veterinary Medical Colleges) with the following 4 broad results areas:
 - Enhanced leadership and sustainable governance capacities
 - Enhanced continuous professional development
 - A functional online community of practice
 - World-class self-assessment tools

Objective 6: To promote quality facilities at African VEEs

Project 6: African Centres of Excellence:

- Initial call yielded poor results
- Re-structuring of 9 initial centres into 5 centres in order to recruit one per region of Africa:

Area 1

- 1.1. Veterinary Policy, legislation and jurisprudence (Regulations and trade in animals and animal products, strategies, etc)
- 1.2. Veterinary Education (pedagogical, assessment, clinical and skill training)

Area 2

- 2.1. Animal welfare
- 2.2. Wildlife Health and biodiversity

Area 3

- 3.1. Veterinary epidemiology (Biosecurity, import and export risk analysis etc)
- 3.2. Veterinary Public Health and One Health approach

Area 4


- 4.1. Veterinary entrepreneurship and innovation (biotechnology, etc)
- 4.2. Veterinary Drug quality and Alternative veterinary therapy

5.1. Clinical Veterinary medicine (by discipline and species differentiation)
