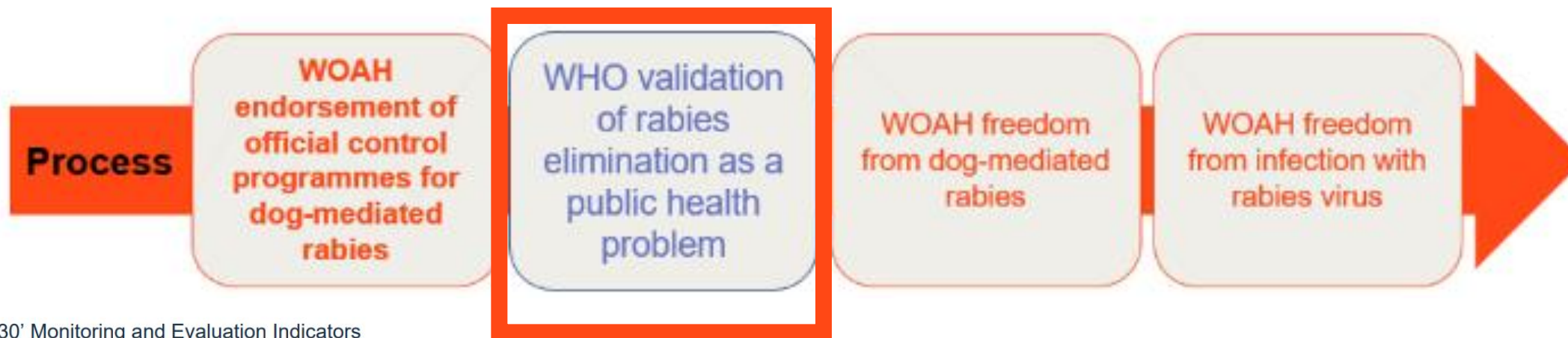

2. Progress – updates to regional plans, increasing number of national strategies developed and implemented, improving coordination between stakeholders
3. But progress is slow – needs to scale up dramatically to reach 2030 goal

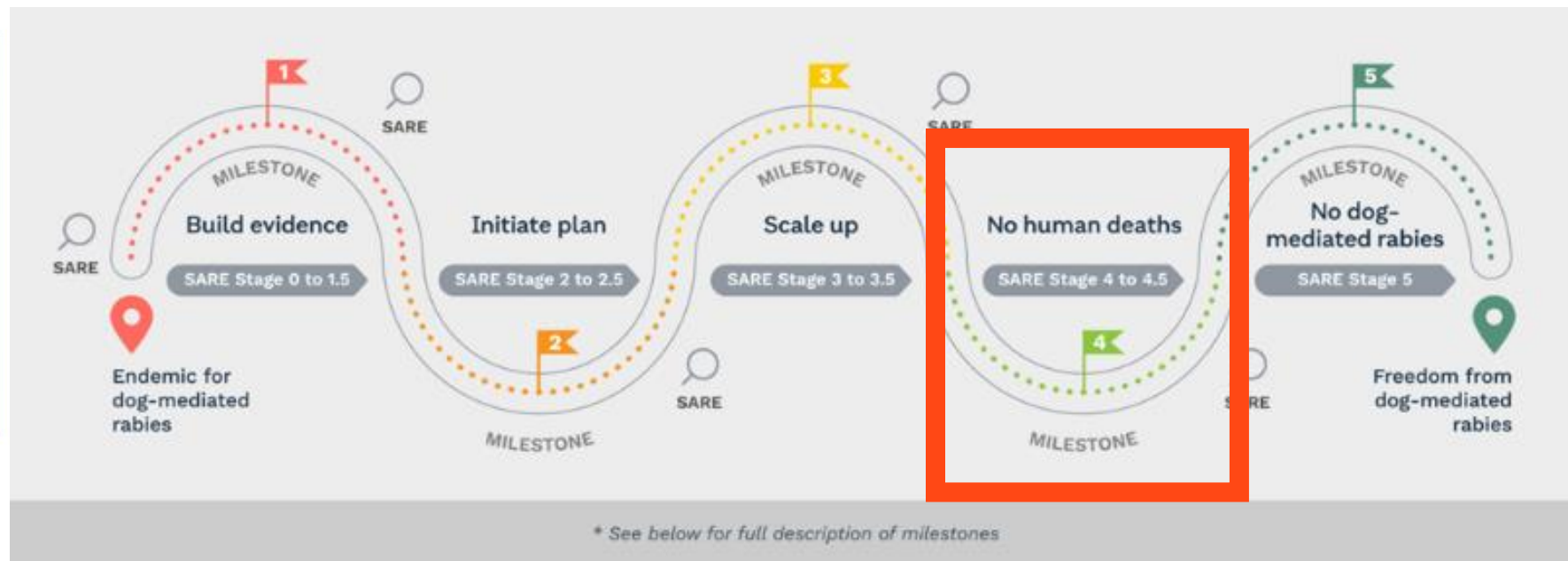




Monitoring progress towards 'Zero by 30'

- **Stepwise Approach to Rabies Elimination (SARE)**

- Can help develop or revise national strategy and work plan, and demonstrate progress through repeat assessments

- **WOAH Endorsement**

- Countries with a robust, One-Health control strategy in place for rabies control.

- **WHO Validation**

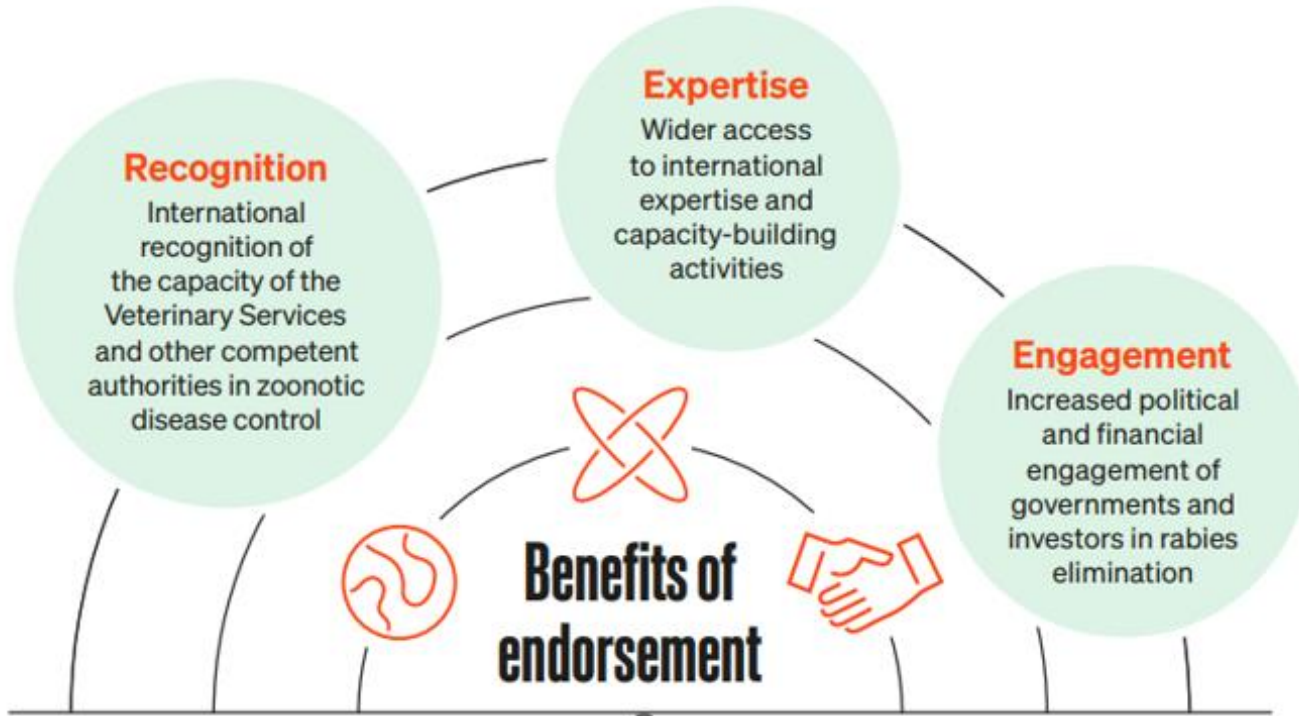
- Countries with zero human deaths from dog-mediated rabies for at least 24 months.

- **WOAH Self-declaration**

- Countries free of dog-mediated rabies

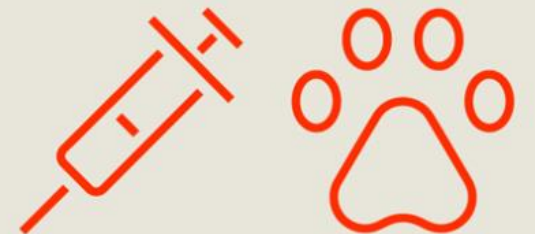


Signifies:

How to apply for endorsement

In line with our procedure and guidelines, Members need to compile documents that evidence:

- ✓ A good understanding of human and dog demographics and epidemiology of the disease on their territory
- ✓ The capacity of the Veterinary Services, along with effective collaboration with other competent authorities
- ✓ Measures to control dog-mediated rabies including surveillance and diagnosis
- ✓ A dog-mediated rabies control strategy with a clear work plan, timelines and budget for the following five years

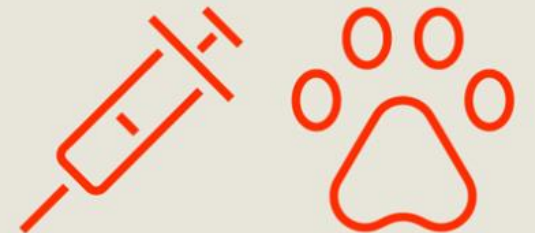

Timeline

- **Submission** of dossier to WOAHA Status Department – **early August 2026**
- Review of dossier by *Ad hoc* group, and recommendation to Scientific Commission for Animal Disease (SCAD) – October 2026
- Review of dossier by SCAD, and recommendation to General Assembly – February 2027
- Approval by General Assembly – May 2027

GUIDANCE DOCUMENT ON APPLICATION FOR ENDORSEMENT OF AN OFFICIAL CONTROL PROGRAMME FOR DOG MEDIATED RABIES

This guide is designed to assist Members compile information according to Article 8.15.11. of the *Terrestrial Animal Health Code*. It includes examples of figures and table templates that can be found in the following appendices with cross-references to specific sections of the questionnaire for application for an endorsement of official control programme for dog-mediated rabies.

Providing high-quality figures like those in the examples is not mandatory but should be provided when available.

Please note that the content of the referenced scientific articles is not related to or part of the guidance.
