Impact of WOAH Standards Internationally



WOAH Codes

- Establishes standards to improve terrestrial animal health and welfare, and veterinary public health
- Support Members in setting up measures for
 - Early detection
 - Internal reporting
 - Notification
 - Control or eradication of pathogenic agents
 - Prevent spread of pathogenic agents via international trade, while avoiding unjustified sanitary barriers to trade
- Based on most recent scientific and technical information
- 2 Volumes – horizontal (Vol I), disease-specific (Vol II)





Terrestrial and Aquatic Codes – User's Guide

- Each Code has a User's Guide that explains how to make the best use of the information in the Codes.
- The Glossary defines terms that are used in more than one chapter, where the definition used in the Code differs from what you would find in the dictionary. Glossary definitions can vary between the codes.
- User's Guide includes a brief summary of the information found in each section of the Code.
- Chapter 1.1 describes Member's obligations under the statutes of WOA. Listed diseases and emerging diseases as indicated in this Chapter are compulsorily notifiable.
- Sanitary measures related to international trade should be based on WOA standards.



Terrestrial and Aquatic Codes – User's Guide

- An international veterinary certificate is an official document issued by the Veterinary Authority of the exporting country that provides assurances to the importing country regarding the health status of the animals and products imported.
- In the *Terrestrial Code* User's Guide contains tables that specify what is meant in the terminology used to describe groups of animals listed in the code. A chapter may refer to animals by Genus and species or may refer to a group of animals (such as 'bees' – animals of the Sub-Family 'Apinae').

Volume II: Disease-specific chapters (overview)

- **Definition of infection/ infestation** and specific epidemiological considerations
- **Safe commodities** where appropriate
 - Safe commodities = based on absence of the pathogenic agent in the traded commodity OR inactivation by processing or treatment that the commodity has undergone
 - Importing countries should not apply trade restrictions to safe commodities with respect to the pathogenic agent concerned
- **Determination of the animal health status** of a country, zone or compartment
 - Self declaration of animal health status



Volume II: Disease-specific chapters (overview)

- **Recommendations on safe trade** for live animals, genetic material, other products of animal origin (meat, milk, eggs, skins, etc.)
- **Specific management** of commodities, e.g.
 - Recommendations on inactivation
 - Vector-protection during pre-export quarantine and transport
- **Recommendations on surveillance**
- Surveillance strategies specific to infection/ infestation
 - Link to Chapter 1.4 and 1.5 on animal health and vector surveillance

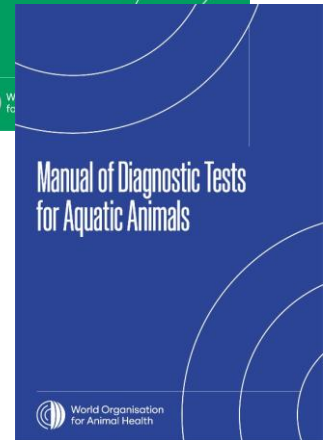
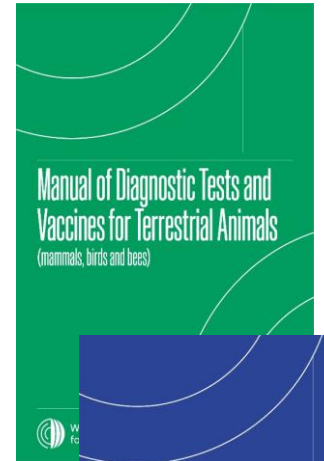
- **Terrestrial Manual**

- Part 1: introductory chapters on general standards for the management of veterinary diagnostic labs and vaccine facilities
- Part 2: elaborates specific recommendations e.g. validation of diagnostic tests and manufacture of vaccines
- Part 3: standards for diagnostic tests and vaccines for specific listed terrestrial diseases, and other important diseases
 - Table of tests available for each disease and their purpose
 - General epidemiological information, diagnostic methods, vaccines

- **Aquatic Manual**

- Part 1: introductory chapters on general provisions to support effective lab testing capability
- Part 2: elaborates specific recommendations for diagnosis of listed aquatic diseases

Role of Specialist Commissions in standard-setting

- Four Specialist Commissions;
- Each Commission comprises six members;
- Each Commission meets twice a year to progress items on their respective work programmes (February and September).

Elected by the World Assembly of Delegates

Experts Selection process

- Open call launched July-Sept. before election year
- Experts worldwide can apply
- Endorsement sought from WOAH Delegate
- Candidates reviewed by a Selection Committee and the WOAH Council
- Council endorsed list shared with Delegates before the election

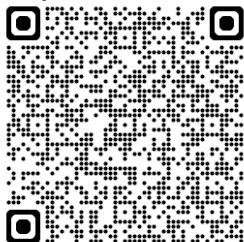

Terrestrial Animal Health Standards Commission

Code Commission

- Oversees amendments to the *Terrestrial Code*
- Oversees the work of relevant ad hoc Groups and Working Groups
- Advises the Director General on issues relevant to its work

Scientific Commission for Animal Diseases

Scientific Commission

- Assesses Member dossiers for the recognition of official animal health status and endorsement of official control programmes
- Supports disease-specific strategies for disease surveillance, prevention and control
- Oversees the work of relevant ad hoc Groups and Working Groups
- Provides technical advice to the Code Commission, where relevant

Aquatic Animal Health Standards Commission

Aquatic Animal Commission

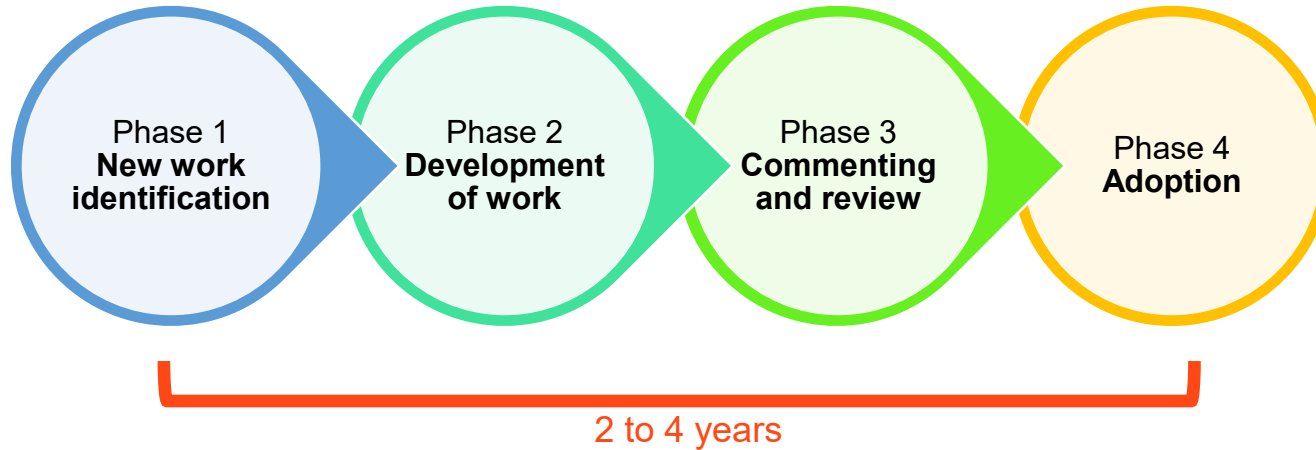
- Oversees amendments to the Aquatic Code and the Aquatic Manual
- Oversee the work of relevant ad hoc Groups
- Proposes the designation of Reference Centres relevant to aquatic animal health and monitors their performance

Biological Standards Commission

- Oversees amendments to the Terrestrial Manual
- Proposes the designation of Reference Centres relevant to terrestrial animal health and monitors their performance
- Provides technical advice to the Code Commission, where relevant



How are WOAH standards developed?



A transparent process to ensure that WOAH International Standards address Members needs and are developed based in the latest science and taking into consideration the different contexts among Members to enable implementation.

Facilitation of safe trade

Even if disease exists in the territory:

- Safe commodities
- Commodity-based recommendations, inactivation parameters
- Zoning
- Compartments



Safe commodities

Article.15.1.2

Safe commodities

When authorising importation or transit of the following *commodities*, *Veterinary Authorities* should not require any ASF-related conditions, regardless of the *animal health status* of the *exporting country* or *zone*:

- 1. heat-treated *meat products* in a hermetically sealed *container* with a F_0 value of 3 or above;
- 2. gelatine;
- 3. extruded dry pet food;

Article.10.4.2

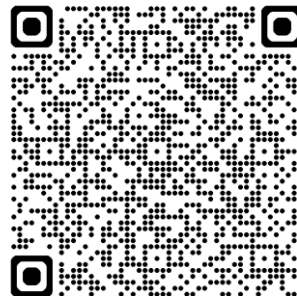
Safe commodities

When authorising importation or transit of the following *commodities*, *Veterinary Authorities* should not require any conditions related to high pathogenicity avian influenza, regardless of the high pathogenicity avian influenza status of the *exporting country* or *zone*:

- 1. heat-treated *poultry meat products* in a hermetically sealed *container* with an F_0 value of 3 or above;
- 2. extruded dry pet food and coated ingredients after extrusion;
- 3. rendered *protein meal*, blood meal, feather meal, and *poultry* oil;
- 4. washed and steam-dried feathers and down from *poultry* and other birds.

Other *commodities* of *poultry* and other birds can be traded safely if in accordance with the relevant articles of this chapter.

Criteria for safe commodities:





Inactivation parameters

Procedures for the inactivation of high pathogenicity avian influenza viruses in meat products from poultry

The following time/temperature combinations are suitable for the inactivation of high pathogenicity avian influenza viruses in *meat products*.

	Core temperature (°C)	Time
Meat products from poultry	60.0	507 seconds
	65.0	42 seconds
	70.0	3.5 seconds
	73.9	0.51 second

These time/temperature combinations are indicative of a range that achieves a 7-log₁₀ reduction of avian influenza virus infectivity. When supported by scientific evidence, variations of these time/temperature combinations may be used if they achieve equivalent inactivation of the virus.

Article.8.12.13

Recommendations for the importation of milk and milk products of bovids

Veterinary Authorities of *importing countries* should require the presentation of an *international veterinary certificate* attesting that the *milk* or *milk* products:

1. have been derived from bovids in a *herd* free from *infection* with *M. tuberculosis* complex; or
2. were subjected to pasteurisation or any combination of control measures with equivalent performance as described in the Codex Alimentarius Code of Hygienic Practice for *Milk* and *Milk* Products.



Provisions for trade from infected countries/zones

Article.11.9.6

Recommendations for importation from countries or zones not free from LSD

For bovines and water buffaloes

Veterinary Authorities should require the presentation of an *international veterinary certificate* attesting that the animals:

1. showed no clinical sign of LSD on the day of shipment;
2. were kept since birth, or for the past 60 days prior to shipment, in an *epidemiological unit* where no *case* of LSD occurred during that period;
3. were vaccinated against LSD according to manufacturer's instructions between 60 days and one year prior to shipment;
4. were demonstrated to have antibodies at least 30 days after *vaccination*;
5. were kept in a *quarantine station* for the 28 days prior to shipment during which time they were subjected to an agent identification test with negative results.



Article.8.8.16

Recommendations for importation of susceptible animals from countries or zones infected with FMDV, where an official control programme exists

Veterinary Authorities should require the presentation of an *international veterinary certificate* attesting that:

1. the *animals* showed no clinical sign of FMD on the day of shipment;
2. if pigs, they have not been fed swill not complying with Article 8.8.35.;
3. prior to isolation, the *animals* were kept in the *establishment* of origin:
 - a. for 30 days, or since birth if younger than 30 days, if a *stamping-out policy* is applied to control FMD in the *exporting country* or *zone*, or
 - b. for three months, or since birth if younger than three months if a *stamping-out policy* is not applied to control FMD in the *exporting country* or *zone*.



Free zones and compartments

Article 10.4.3

Country or zone free from high pathogenicity avian influenza

A country or **zone** may be considered free from high pathogenicity avian influenza when:

- **infection** with high pathogenicity avian influenza viruses is a **notifiable disease** in the entire country;
- an ongoing awareness programme is in place to encourage reporting of suspicions of high pathogenicity avian influenza;
- absence of **infection** with high pathogenicity avian influenza viruses, based on **surveillance**, in accordance with Chapter 1.4. and Articles 10.4.26. to 10.4.30., has been demonstrated in the country or **zone** for the past 12 months;
- an awareness programme is in place related to avian influenza viruses **risks** and the specific **biosecurity** and management measures to address them;
- **commodities** are imported in accordance with Articles 10.4.7. to 10.4.22.

Surveillance should be adapted to parts of the country or existing **zones** depending on historical or geographical factors, industry structure, **population** data and proximity to recent **outbreaks** or the use of **vaccination**.

Article 10.4.7

Recommendations for importation from a country, zone or compartment free from high pathogenicity avian influenza

For live poultry (other than day-old poultry)

Veterinary Authorities should require the presentation of an **international veterinary certificate** attesting that:

1. the **poultry** showed no clinical signs of avian influenza on the day of shipment;
2. the **poultry** originated from a country, **zone** or **compartment** free from high pathogenicity avian influenza;
3. the **poultry** originated from a **flock** that was monitored for avian influenza viruses and was found to be negative;
4. the **poultry** are transported in new or appropriately sanitised **containers**.

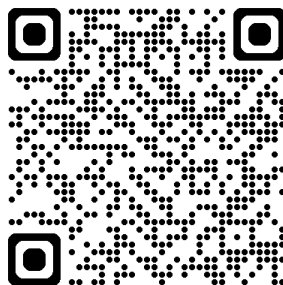

WAHIS: World Animal Health Information System

WAHIS is the global animal health reference database of the World Organisation for Animal Health (WOAH). WAHIS data reflects the validated information since 2005 reported by the Veterinary Services from Member and non-Member Countries and Territories on terrestrial and aquatic Listed diseases in domestic animals and wildlife, as well as on emerging diseases and zoonoses.

WAHIS includes interactive mapping tools and dashboards to support data consultation, visualization and extraction of officially validated animal health data.

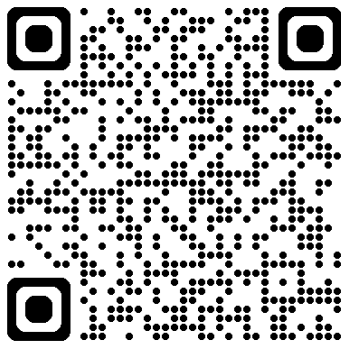

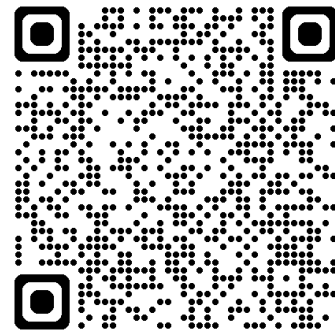

Self-declared Disease Status

In accordance with the provisions of the Terrestrial Animal Health Code (Terrestrial Code) or the Aquatic Animal Health Code (Aquatic Code), Members may wish to self-declare the freedom of their country, zone or compartment from a disease. A Member wishing to publish its self-declaration for disease-freedom, should provide the relevant documented evidence of compliance with the provisions of the relevant chapters of the Codes.

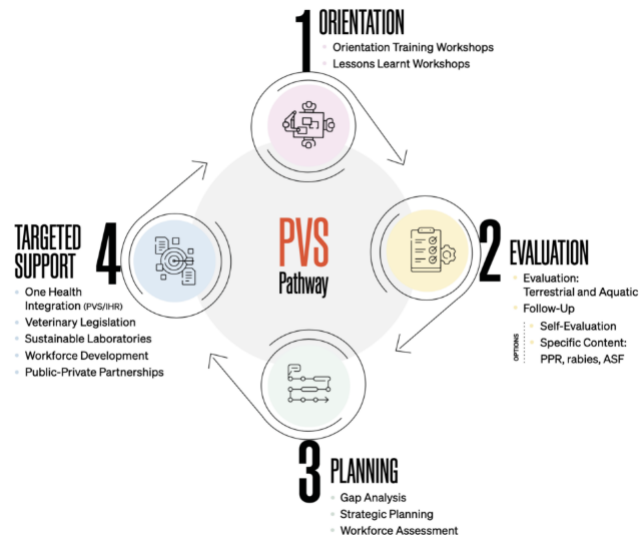
