Challenges


Poor awareness of the dangers of counterfeiting

 - No anti-counterfeiting action plans
 - No risk indicators with regard to IPR
- Lack of dedicated IPR/health& safety teams

 Need for stronger support from management /Customs


Lack of cooperation between agencies

Seizures of medicinal products by type 2015-2016






Percentage change in medicinal products cases 2015-2016








Co-ordination and communication

- Co-ordinated border management effective way
 of managing border operations with the objective
 of facilitating legitimate trade and ensuring secure
 borders.
- Interagency communication is vital across countries, regions and continents.

- International cooperation and communication Cooperation can take place through policy declarations, memorandum (MOU), bi and multilateral agreements:
- Communication is also key and local levels between officers on the ground, between neighbouring states and multinational communication and cooperation.

Challenges the region faces and a result of poor co operation and communiction

 There will not be enough focus and attention given to counterfeit, illicit and substandard goods both for human consumption and animal related products.

- Lack of information sharing at grass root levels between different organisations.
- Lack of effective training for officers on the ground.
- We will lose the battle against criminal syndicates.

Benefits of effective co operation

- Effective combatting of organised crime and such threats.
- Effective use of limited resources.
- Better and effective intelligence driven operations.
- Greater focus on veterinary products.
- Protection of society as a whole.
- Greater legislation development.

WCO Regional entities

- RILOs responsible for the collection and analysis of enforcement related data.
- ROCBs Assists member countries with their capacity building programmes at the regional level.
- RTCs contributes to the regionalization of capacity building by providing facilities for training.

- RCLs provide training and resources for members on identifying and analysing chemical samples.
- RDTCs provides practical and theoretical training programmes for dog handlers.
